**\*DOIs:** A DOI, or digital object identifier, is a series of digits and letters that leads to the location of an online source. Articles in journals are often assigned DOIs to ensure that the source is locatable, even if the URL changes. If your source is listed with a DOI, use that instead of a URL.

#### Tips:

1. To see examples and to cite additional common sources such as films, radio broadcasts, letters, interviews, cartoons, etc. see the **MLA Handbook: 8th ed. (Call Number 808.02 MLA)**. The **MLA Handbook** is a comprehensive and authoritative MLA guide.
2. Citing a book by two authors—give the names in the same order as they appear on the title page, reversing the name of the first author only, add a comma and give the other name(s) in normal form (Gilyard, Keith, Deborah Holdstein, and Charles Schuster.)
3. Citing a book by three or more authors—give the name of the first author only followed by et al. (Gilyard, Keith, et al.). Note that et al. means “and others”.
